TECHNICAL STUFF * BOB Russo

It has often been said that "Locks are for honest people" and the same holds true for automobile anti-theft devices. The best that we can hope for from such a device is that it deters the thief and he moves on to another vehicle. However, the desirability of a Porsche will many times cause a potential thief to persist until he has his prize. Basically, we are confronted with two types of thieves; the youth who wants a joy-ride and the professional who is bent on resale. The former can usually be scared off easily, but the latter requires much stronger methods since his motives are more serious and he is a practiced criminal.

For all practical purposes, anti-theft devices can be divided into two major categories: warning systems and disabling devices. The alarm systems use either the car's horn or an auxilliary siren. The advantage of the siren is that it can be heard for a greater distance, makes the attempted theft more obvious and can be inaccessibly hidden. Whichever alarm you decide to use, you should wire it thru a relay so that once activated it will continue to sound until it is turned off by a master switch which you have carefully hidden somewhere on the vehicle.

Another situation facing the car owner is the theft of accessories such as mag wheels. One way to handle this (and the possibility of towing the car away) is through the use of a motion switch which detects any movement of the car. Another warning type device which has a great deal of merit is the "voltage drop" operated alarm. Once this system is set, any use of electricity such as lighting the interior light by opening the door, engaging the starter, blowing the horn, etc. will activate the alarm.

Of course, the success of any of these alarms is dependent on a number of factors. Firstly, the alarm itself must be inaccessible. Secondly, all wiring must be carefully concealed as must be any activating switches. And most importantly, the system should be carefully checked at regular intervals to insure proper protection.
