



a little over zealous with the black flag (they must have watched the CART race in Canada) but they never failed to get your attention.




After the drawing the vollyball game resumed and the picnic came to a quiet end.

PIKE'S PEAK PARADE REPORT

For me, this year's Porsche Parade was the culmination of a two-week, twelve-state trek Around the USA.

The first leg was a business trip to Minneapolis. (I saw an interesting license plate in Wisconsin. A Chevy Sprint had Minnesota tag "356 Cub." I wonder if he thought his Chevy would become a 356 when it grew up?) the second leg was a family reunion near Denver and the Grand Finale was the 33rd Porsche Parade in Colorado Springs.

The mountains northwest of Denver are phenominal. A quick trip up US40 (which has some steep slopes, sheer dropoffs and wild switchbacks) gave my new engine a workout. Despite the blistering heat (about 100 degrees F), the high altitude (over 10,000 feet) and the steep hills, the oil temperature didn't go above 220 degrees F. Yes, a 2.4 litre 911S will do 80 up a steep mountain pass.

After a brief stay near Denver, it was off to Colorado Springs -- to the Parade!

Sunday was registration and tech inspection. Miller Beer and General Tire sponsored a welcome party outside the Clarion.

Monday was the Concours d'Elegance, sponsored by Porsche Cars North America. Besides the multitude of finely prepared street cars, some extraordinary cars were on display. These included the orginial Cisitalia Grand Prix Wagen; the Formula I car that represented Porsche's first and only win in that area, in Rouen, France in 1960 with Dan Gurney behind the wheel; a 910; a 934; a 936 and a 962. We were also buzzed, at 100 feet, by a Mooney-Porsche airplane. Porsche sponsored a box lunch, complete with basket. I washed my car after the concours (no, I didn't enter), and of course it rained within two hours.

Tuesday was the Yokohama rallye. I met a delightful lady from the San Diego Region who agreed to navigate for me. We both decided not to take the rallye too seriously, but rather to enjoy the beautiful Colorado scenery. After a slow start -- first two checkpoints maxxed -- we had our best leg after an unscheduled stop: only 0.73 minutes (43.8 seconds) late. The rallye ended at the Air Force Academy after the sixth checkpoint. Altogether, we had 2,027 points of a possible 6,000, which put us about 250th of 320 cars in the unequipped class. The Kellers took top Riesentoter position and the Coopers second.

After the rallye was the only chance for a walk-through of the BFG autocross course. This was held on the parking lot of the Rocky Mountain Greyhound Park (dog racing track), and the course was BIG -- over 0.8 mile from start to finish. It took Wednesday through Friday to run the autocross, and the rain on Thursday and Friday didn't help. I ran Thursday afternoon, just before the rain began. There was one practice run, followed by two official runs, all three of which were timed.

Meanwhile on Friday, Jeannie -- my navigator from the rallye -- and I decided to climb Pike's Peak. This is best done in the morning, so after breakfast at the Calrion, we headed out. The first 7.0 miles are paved. From 7.0 to 19.2, it is packed gravel/dirt. The unpaved 12.2 miles is the part used for the hillclimb (which this year was run two weeks prior to the Parade), and the record time is 10 minutes 47 seconds, for an average speed of nearly 68 mph. There isn't more than 1,000 feet of straightaway anywhere, and the switchbacks are extremely tight. guardrail anywhere, either. About halfway up we met the Kellers coming down. three miles are above tree line, and it was clear and sunny until the last mile. The top of the mountain, at 14,110 feet, was shrouded Shortly after 12:30 we headed back in fog. down. The trip down was mostly first gear through pea soup fog, rain, hail, snow and


on a surface of packed mud. A typical afternoon on Pike's Peak, which is why it is best climbed in the morning. The Porsche performed well, even above 14,000 feet, thanks to the altitude compensator on the Bosch mechanical fuel injection system.

Saturday morning was the Bosch Tech Quiz. How did your Tech Chairman do? Well, Bill Cooper and I had identical 78/3 scores (78 questions and 3 tiebreakers right). Bill took first in the Late 911 class and I took third in the Early 911 class, as there were a few heavy hitters in the older class. There were only two other scores all day that beat us. Debbie Cooper also took first in the Ladies Late 911 class with a score that beat most of the men. Riesentoter shined in this event.

Goodies were available all week at the Pirelli Goodies Store. T-shirts, books, Porsche Design items, almost anything Porsche related.

All in all, Alpine Mountain and Rocky Mountain Regions put on a class act. It was a well organized Parade, the meals were great and the trophies, were fabulous -- a sculpture of Porsche serial number 356-001 going through a switchback on Pike's Peak. The original artwork was presented to Wolfgang Porsche to take back to his father.

I'm looking forward to next year's Parade in Traverse City, Michigan. I hope Riesentoter can have a bigger turnout next year. For those of you who have never been to a Parade, it's something you have to experience to believe.
