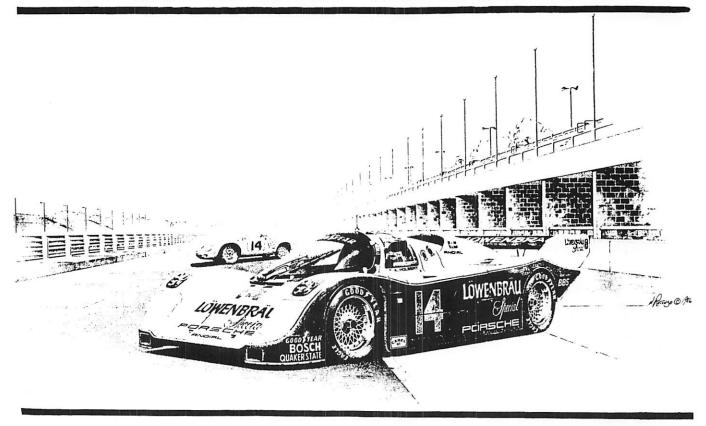

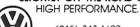




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## President's Message

- Have you spent more than you paid for it

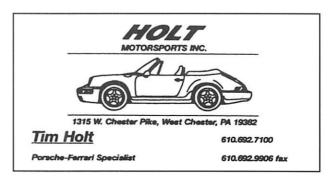

## Porsche SUV Sales Goals

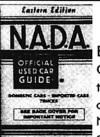
NEW YORK, -- Porsche AG expects to sell between 20,000 and 25,000 units a year of its sport utility vehicle on a worldwide basis in calendar year 2002. The new 2002 model year SUV, a joint venture between Porsche and Volkswagen, would boost Porsche's sales by about 50 percent. The off-road, four-wheel drive vehicles will be individually branded but jointly developed by both automakers.

"We'll sell about 20,000 to 25,000, but we are capable of producing more than that," Porsche Cars North America General Manager of Public Relations, Bob Carlson told reporters at the New York Auto Show on Wednesday.

Porsche and Volkswagen are expected to announce the production site for the new SUV this spring. The two companies are expected to choose an existing car plant and not build a new facility to manufacture the new vehicle.

of registration this year we had to wait until Thursday to get our passes. Without being registered, you could not attend anything, even the goodie store.

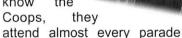
I don't have the various results for the events (there will be a complete list in Pano) but the

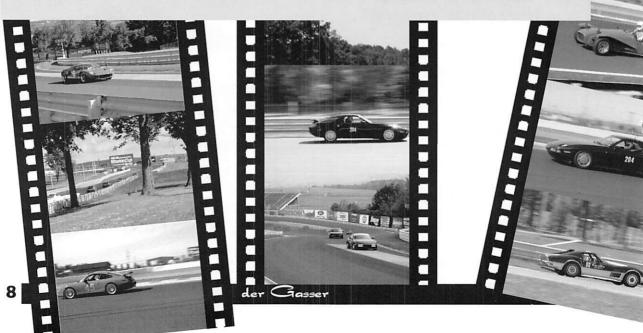
## Reflections from the Glen

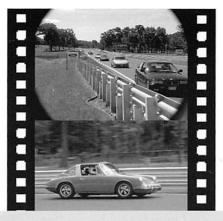

THE BUYER was brainwashed and his mind set at an early age; for him and his brothers and sister a family outing often consisted of a hill climb or rally or SCCA event with their dad in this '66 911. Upon reaching driving age, an occasional

stint behind the wheel cemented the desire. Through high school and college and marriage and birth of two children, the dream lived ... then the time arrived. Achievements and promotions and the agreement of his wife meant the search could begin.

Warned by his father that, "Porsche people are NOT, repeat NOT, normal". THE BUYER made Panorama. der Gasser. Excellence and Christophorus daily reading with emphasis on the 'For Sale' sections. Then one day there it was...the age, color, mileage, description were perfect, the price subject to agreeable negotiations, and the meet set, THE BUYER's responsibilities as National Sales Manager made the trip to North Carolina legitimate; two days

with his salesman then the salesman took THE BUYER to the SELLER's residence. The salesman stayed only long enough to see that the deal would be done. THE BUYER and THE SELLER negotiated on the drive (THE BUYER driving) to a dealership for a purchase appraisal. Armed with a glowing appraisal they returned to THE SELLER's and adjourned to the kitchen table; as THE BUYER was completing the check he was startled by a new sound ... looking across the table he saw THE SELLER crying!! ## Porsche Chosen as One of the World's Best Managed Companies

ATLANTA, Aug. 16 -- Dr. Ing. H.c. F. Porsche AG of Stuttgart, Germany, has been chosen by the editors of INDUSTRY WEEK magazine as one of the world's 100 best-managed companies.

Porsche was selected for this fourth annual list from the INDUSTRY WEEK 1000, a list of the world's largest publicly held manufacturing companies based on revenues. Each company was chosen after a lengthy evaluation that included the following four steps: analysis of the company's financial performance; review of a questionnaire that each INDUSTRY WEEK 1000 company was given an opportunity to complete; research into each company's practices in areas such as philanthropy and safety; and voting by a panel of more than 100 business leaders, analysts, and academicians.

"INDUSTRY WEEK's 100 Best-Managed Companies demonstrate superior, consistent financial performance," commented John Brandt, editor-in-chief of INDUSTRY WEEK. "We also honor those companies for investing heavily in such areas as research and development, new markets, employees, and society."

"This is a distinction for the entire Porsche team," added Dr. Wendelin Wiedeking, chairman of the Porsche AG board of management. "We see this more than anything else as an incentive not just to maintain our leading position on the sports car market, but to develop

it even more."

### Bird Droppings, Bug Stuff, and Blemishes

The warm weather has been with us, and that also means that we have to vigilantly deal with those little spots of something other than paint appearing on the surface of our cars. These little specks, that inevitably drive us mad until the autumn leaves fall, can cause blemishes on the paint surface.

No car that is driven is immune to bird droppings, splattered insects, and tree sap. All these substances can quickly blemish your car's paint. While a good coat of wax is your best protection, the best way to prevent blemishes is to inspect your car on a regular basis and remove any offending substances as soon as possible. Cold water and a towel should work well to remove most problems. Harder cases can be removed with a one-step wax.

If bird droppings, which contain acid, are allowed to sit on the paint for several days, you will have to both polish and wax your paint to remove the blemish. This involves going over the spot several times to remove the mark and blend the blemish into the surrounding paint. Use a fine-grit, polish-like sealer and glaze at least three to four times before getting out the polishing compound.

Remember, this entire process can be eliminated if you make routine inspections of your vehicle's finish and remove harmful substances as soon as they appear. I can not stress this point enough!

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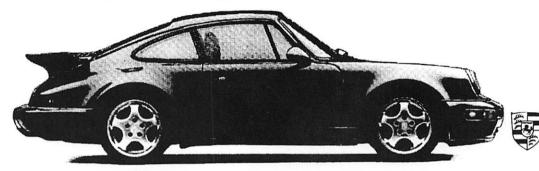
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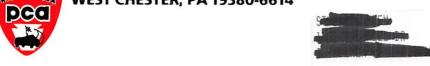


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
