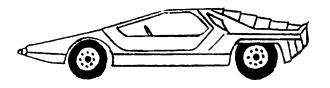

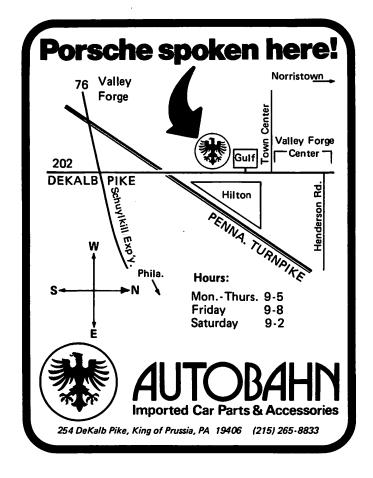

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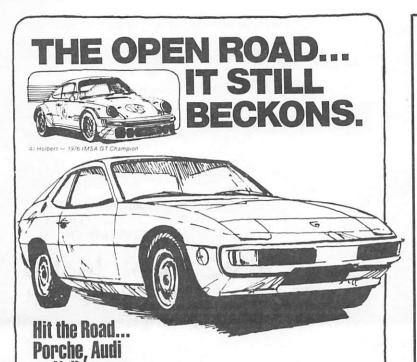
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You'd buy a car because you really loved to

And those still ARE the days!

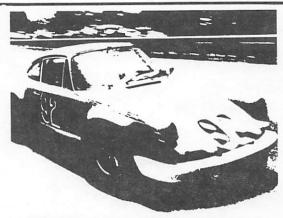
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Notes from a Novice, cont.
