The Year of Involvement - only a few events left to be involved in!




Vintage Car Show



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Riesentoter Award

As the most recent recipients of the Region's most important, most coveted and oldest award, we were asked to provide an explanation of the award and its history.

The inscription on the 12" pewter (not sterling silver) bowl reads:

Porsche Club of America Eastern Penna. Region Activities Champion Der Beste Riesentoter Des Jahres

As you know, PCA was founded in 1955. The Eastern Pennsylvania Region was founded two years later as the second PCA region which encompassed eastern Pennsylvania, including what are now Central Pennsylvania and Pocono regions and Southern New Jersey. Previously. PCA had been a National Club without regional breakdown. The "Activities Champion Award" was originally given to the member who accummulated the most points over the year. We were unable to find in the historical files how many points were assigned for the various activities. During the 60's, Der Gasser occasionally listed the point totals for men and women, although only names of men appear on the bowl until the 80's. During the mid-1970's there is record of a Ladies Riesentoter Award, but names were only identified for 1973-1974. We wondered what happened to this part of our history. Does anyone know? Although we were unable to document any formal change, in 1978 nominees were requested for men and "ladies too".

A description has been stated in a number of ways by many of the past presidents, but the award is given to the person or persons who in the opinion of their peers has made the greatest contribution to or on behalf of the club, or those who have made contributions to the club over a number of years. Literally translated, "Der Beste Riesentoter Des Jahres" is "best Riesentoter of the year". It is interesting to note that the use of the word Riesentoter, meaning Giant Killer, was part of the inscription long before it was adopted as the official name of the region in 1973.

The coveted bowl was first awarded in 1959, to a person instrumental in founding our region, Charlie Beidler. He also received the award in 60, becoming the first two-time winner. Other multiyear recipients include the late Dick Sweigart (65 and 70), Vern Lyle (74, 75, and 81) and Bob Russo (76 and 83). In 80, in overdue recognition probably that club activities often require the efforts of both spouses, the first joint presentation was made to Don and Linda Applestein. Since 1980, the Riesentoter award has had six joint recipients.

The award is presented each year for the "greatest contribution" to the Previously, Club. the selection committee included the immediate past and current recipients and the incumbent President. Although it is often presented to members of the Executive Committee, it must be emphasized that it is not presented for merely performing the duties of the office, but for extraordinary service.

When Bill was President in 1984, the award was presented to John and Jill Heckman. At that time, John was Membership Chairman but did not receive the award for performing the duties of the office. John and Jill conceived the idea of a New Members Meeting and proceeded to organize and carry out this idea

using a sample of each model in a show setting and had longer term members make presentations on the various Club activities. This concept was so successful and well-received that the New Members Meeting has become a regular event on the Club calendar.

Bowl The Riesentoter has been awarded 32 times and the list of recipients reads like a list of "Who's Who" in the history of the region. We are proud to be included in this special group of Riesentoters. Although we have the bowl proudly displayed in our home, we look forward to the presentation to the 33rd recipient(s) at the Christmas Banquet in December.
